Including People with Disabilities in Recreation: Participation Tools (0.1 CEU) * This continuing education session content is pre-approved by NCTRC

Communities often provide valuable adaptive recreation programs for people with disabilities. But what if individuals want to participate in an inclusive environment with their non-disabled peers? This workshop introduces recreation professionals to the benefits of and approaches to inclusive recreation, with practical strategies and resources to increase successful inclusive participation.

Outcomes:

1. Describe the benefits of inclusive recreation participation for people with and without disabilities.
2. Examine general accommodations and strategies that can be employed to support inclusive recreation participation across five functioning domains.
3. Compare resources and tools that can aid recreation professionals and individuals with disabilities or their family members to discuss the need for inclusive recreation participation.

Texas Parks and Wildlife: Recreation Grant Funding For Your Community (0.1 CEU)

The TPWD Recreation Grants Division is committed to assisting communities throughout Texas in meeting their outdoor recreation needs. Each year, these grants significantly impact the creation of new parks, improved access, development of outdoor programs, and more. You can learn about the Local Parks, Boating Access & Infrastructure, Recreational Trails, Target Range, and Community Outdoor Outreach Programs. Find out how these grants can benefit your community and learn how to apply for them.

Outcomes:

1. Recall 5 potential funding opportunities
2. Describe the updated Local Park grant scoring criteria
3. Identify 1 area of opportunity to leverage grant funds to create or improve a park

Classroom B

Exploring the Pickleball Phenomenon: Paddle Power for Parks Progress (0.1 CEU)

Play has often been credited with the development of problem-solving skills. This session will focus particularly on the cognitive and social skills development of the individual and the impact/influence on group dynamics. Through activities (demonstration and hands-on), participants will sharpen their observation and communication competencies in an effort to enhance their consumer's engagement in activities and problem-solving processes.

Outcomes:

1. Define "problem-solving" and outline the process; as well as identify at least two prerequisites (e.g., identifying deviation between what is and what should be; or motivation to solve problem or resources available)
2. Recall at least three limitations to effective problem-solving (decision-making) including the importance of identifying connections among problems.
3. Discuss how a designated activity promotes cognitive and social skill development (Activity Analysis).
